U.S. Land History, Part VI Translated from Spanish by Luis G. Zorilla, Archivist. Provided by Joe Carey, LS, PE, Ret.

This boundary commission's duty included the correction of errors on the Disturnell map, which had served as the basis, in the Treaty, for showing the New Mexico boundary from present dat El Paso Texas to Yuma Arizona.

The commission found a solution acceptable to both countries, and even though it was approved by the U.S State Department and Department of the Interior, it was later repudiated by Washington, giving pretext to a new U.S. Government land grab for more Mexican territory, which they later obtained. Indeed Mexico was in no condition to offer any resistance. Thus it was that the Gadsden Agreement ("La Mesilla") was signed Dec 30th 1853 (Cliff Lewis' birthday). Before ratificationon April 25, 1854, by the U.S. Senate, it was completely modified, and a new version ratified in an exchange dated June 30, 1855. This Treaty established the border as per Article I of the Gadsden agreement. (The boundary itself was a minor consideration- other documents from my own research show that the U.S. was anxious to be relieved of an erroneous commitment stipulated in Article XI of the Hidalgo Treaty. It required that the U.S. must protect Mexican citizens south of the border from Indian attacks in the "Indian Territory" shown on the Disturnell map. By Article II of the Gadsden agreement, Mexico agreed to forego protection in exchange for ten million dollars, which was paid by the U.S. It appears from verbal reports to me, made by engineers in Jalisco Mexico, to whom I was teaching English in 1994-1995, that President Santa Ana received the money intended for the national treasury, pocketed it himself, and took off for Europe on the next boat. Santa Ana, for all that he had valiantly attacked the Alamo 20 years earlier, with 5000 highly trained Mexican soldiers in front of him is widely known today as the Mexican Judas Iscariot. Bi-cultural people near the border prefer the title: Mexican Benedict Arnold!) Authors footnote.

U.S. Land History (Continued from Page 1...)

The commission charged with the duty of marking the border on the ground finished the job in June 1856, and everything looked rosy. But it was not. The commission had barely concluded their work when the new plenipotenciary minister in Washington, John Forsyth, received instructions in 1857 to acquire parts of Chihuahua, Sonora, and all of Baja California. Two years later, in the middle of a reform movement in Mexico- (The liberation of Bento Juarez) the succeeding plenipotenciary minister, Robert MsLane, ordered the purchase of Baja California from the Juarez government along with acquisition of transient rights across Sonora from Matamores to Mazatlan, and also across Tehuantepec. Nevertheless the monuments placed in 1848 and 1853 would have to prevail, even though after many years, distrust persisted and gave the Mexican administration

no piece of mind, occasioned by continual slight modifications

of the line.

In effect, the two rivers that marked the boundary. Changes in the course of the Rio Grande, during floods and droughts frequently cut the neck of some previous curve, leaving portions of Mexico on the other side by hundreds of meters, and erosion might produce the opposite effect. Below El Paso-Juarez a short time after 1856, the river divided into two branches, leaving Isleta and other little towns on the American side, and by 1866, El Chamizal sprung up in the same region. To resolve these problems, which now came under international law, the two countries developing theories and proposing solutions, signed various agreements. One such was Nov. 12, 1883, by which changes due to accretion were accepted, but not those due to avulsion. Another was March 10, 1889, which established the River Limits Commission to distribute the additions and diminutions effected by the rivers, in spite of the fact that the Hidalgo Treaty indicates that a

permanently fixed border was marked, everywhere, including the part marked by rivers. The Treaty also permits border changes by mutual consent.


Recognizing the principle of continuously change river boundaries, and at the same time adjacent portions of the border not controlled by streams are marked by permanent fixed monuments, that portion from El Paso-Juarez to the Pacific Ocean should cause no problem, except possibly the short stretch (20 miles) of theColorado River. Nevertheless a few problems cropped up even in the geodetically determined portions of the line, and such problems are the ones that induced Zorilla to write the original Spanish of this report.

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
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Job Wanted


The CLSA website is in the process of moving to central office. Once this change is made the address will stay the same but the password will change to "chains". We will keep you posted.
