METRIC – Where In the World Are We? by Bob Fredricks L.S.

History:

The push for the United States to go metric began with the Metric Conversion Act of 1975. This began a national policy encouraging the use of the metric system. At this point it was a voluntary program and it was hoped that it would catch on in business and product sectors. Support for this change was limited. Then in 1988 the Omnibus Trade and Competitiveness Act was passed by congress. This amended the Metric Conversion Act of 1975 to make the metric system the preferred system of weights and measures for America's trade and commerce. What this did was force all federal agencies to adopt a metric system. The effect on engineers and surveyors was felt by the 5-year plan for metric conversion by the Federal Highway Administration, which was approved by the Secretary of Transportation in 1991. This set the requirement and deadline of October 1996 for all states to be metric. This was later amended by the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995 to a conversion date of October 2000. It was later removed altogether.

Status:

Presently the Federal Highway Administration policy is to remain metric internally. Dual units are being used with metric first and imperial in parentheses on external publications. Caltrans, in August of 1998, told local agencies they must use metric on projects on the state highway system but could use either on projects off the system. This was later amended in October 1999 to the use of dual units on projects up to \$1 million within the state right-of-way. Many of the local agencies that have gone metric have adopted the Caltrans standards and specifications. It has also created boilerplate contract documents to help local agencies with Federal-aid projects. Caltrans has begun to produce fewer projects with imperial units and will grant metric exceptions on a case by case basis.

It's worth noting that presently the United States and Myanmar (formerly Burma) are the only nations still using imperial units as a primary system of measure.

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

Keeping it all in perspective

On 18 February 2001, while racing for fame and fortune, Dale Earnhardt died in the last lap of the Daytona 500. It was surely a tragedy for his family, friends and fans. He was 49 years old with grown children, one, which was in the race. I am new to the NASCAR culture so much of what I know has come from the

newspaper and TV. He was a winner and earned everything he had. This included more than "\$41 million in winnings and ten times that from endorsements and souvenir sales". He had a beautiful home and a private jet. He drove the most sophisticated cars allowed and every part was inspected and replaced as soon as there was any evidence of wear. This is normally fully funded by the car and team sponsors. Today, there is no TV station that does not constantly remind us of his tragic end and the radio already has a song of tribute to this winning driver. Nothing should be taken away from this man, he was a professional and the best in his profession. He was in a very dangerous business but the rewards were great.

Two weeks ago seven U.S. Army soldiers died in a training accident when two UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters collided during night maneuvers in Hawaii. The soldiers were all in their twenties, pilots, crewchiefs and infantrymen. Most of them lived in sub-standard housing. If you add their actual duty hours (in the field, deployed) they probably earn something close to minimum wage. The aircraft they were in were between 15 and 20 years old. Many times parts were not available to keep them in good shape due to funding. They were involved in the extremely dangerous business of flying in the Kuhuku mountains at night. It only gets worse when the weather moves in as it did that night. Most times no one is there with a yellow or red flag to slow things down when it gets critical. Their children were mostly toddlers who will lose all memory of who "Daddy" was as they grow up. They died training to defend our freedom.

I take nothing away from Dale Earnhardt but ask you to perform this simple test. Ask any of your friends if they know who was the NASCAR driver killed on 18 February 2001. Then ask them if they can name one of the seven soldiers who died in Hawaii two weeks ago.

18 February 2001, Dale Earnhardt died driving for fame and glory at the Daytona 500. The nation mourns. Seven soldiers died training to protect our freedom. No one can remember their names.
